Show Notes

If anyone knows where we can borrow more tables for the show please let Rick Baker know. 717-334-1292 The club voted to allow George Rienfried to distribute fliers about his carving cruise at the annual show. A couple of phone calls have brought up minor concerns to address in future shows. 1. We need to come up with a precise definition of "Miniatures" for our miniature category. 2. People should not be in the judging room when the pieces are being judged. 3. We should consider getting outside judges in future shows to eliminate favoritism since we all know the work of our members so well. 4. It was pointed out that even though chip carving is not "real carving" we did fail to list it as a category in our show flier. Yes Nick, Chip Carving will be included in our show this year. Joe DeAngelis did comment that overlooking the mistake would be "no great loss".

Woodburning by Nick W. Sciortino

Nick was introduced by his cousin Nick S. Sciortino (Koz) where upon Koz was presented 2 jewelry box tops to chip carve by his cousin.

Pyrographics, meaning "Writing with Fire" was developed long ago. Many different materials can be burned including wood, paper and leather. Nick usually burns wood. Paper is also good as long as it is at least 140lb paper.


Any thin light colored wood will work for burning, some wood is toxic however so it is essential to have a well ventilated spot to do your wood burning. The first step to a woodburning is to sand, sand, sand down to a 220 grit sandpaper. After the board is smooth, clean the board and seal it with an acrylic sealer (this will keep the pattern from smearing). Next using wax free tracing paper, transfer your pattern to a board.

Three factors every good woodburning must have is Contrast, Contour, and a light source. Contrast can be established using things such as lights and darks, close and far away, varying colors, or small and large.

Contour may be achieved for example with adding rounded logs or a folded paper to your picture. There also must always be a light source from one direction in your picture.

Before starting to burn always wash your hands! You will only need a few tools, a burner, a skew tip, a shading tip and a strop to keep the tips clean.

Always practice your strokes on a practice board before actually touching your art work. Woodburning is permanent and not easily corrected. If a mistake is made you will have to start over. Practice is essential! Start with the board tilted so the heat does not burn your hand. Use your Pinky for stability and make your strokes by pulling the tip toward yourself. Some techniques used include cross hatching, stippling, and scribbling. Thin lines are usually made with a skew and a lower temperature setting. For heavier lines turn the heat up or use a slower stroke. Use a shader for thicker lines. Nick finishes his art by again spraying it with sealer, sometimes he will use oil paints for color after it is sealed. Thin wood can be framed to give it a finished look. Thanks for your interesting program Nick!
