## Everything you want to know about Chickadees

Chickadees are a friendly bird and not shy! They are likely to let you know when they get hungry. Chickadees remind us of Quakers in a costume of a neat black cap and bib, white breast and gray smooth back. In reality, however, they are less like sober churchgoers and more like acrobats with an attitude. So says, author Cynthia Berger in her writings. Always show action when carving a chickadee.

One of the most popular birds in North America – and the most widespread. Resident chickadee species include: Carolina chickadee, Mountain chickadee, Chestnut-backed chickadee, Mexican chickadee, Boreal chickadee (Canada), the grey-headed chickadee (Alaska), and the Black-capped chickadee.

Black-capped chickadees are like Carolina chickadees – Carolina chickadees lack the white edges on their wings and wing coverts and are slightly smaller in size.

Songs for most birds have a regional dialect like humans. Chickadees have a constant sound throughout North America – with one exception – Cape Cod residents. Chickadees do not like to fly across water – so young birds in that area do not disperse like they do elsewhere.

Only 20% of food comes from feeders. They eat caterpillars and tiny insects. They can catch insects in mid-air like hummingbirds.

Chickadees hide food in caches – they can remember where their caches are for about 48 days. Brain cells die off – they lose old memories – grow new cells. Science is taking notice to determine if there is something that can be adapted to humans – Rockefeller University.

Breeding:

Starting in the fall – select mates-breed in spring-floaters move from flock to flock  
Surviving the winter and always looking for a single female!

Chickadees weigh less than an average first class letter – how do they survive?

They have denser plumage than most birds of similar size and they are good at fluffing those feathers for extra insulation.

Chickadees allow their bodies to experience a kind of controlled hypothermia. They gradually increase the time between bouts of shivering until their body temperatures drop from a daytime average of about 108 degrees to a low of 86 degrees. This slows their metabolism about 25% which allows them to make it through the night on fewer calories.

Finally, they cache food and eat while roosting at night.

A show committee meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 9 at 7:00pm at the EBACC. Everyone is welcome to come with suggestions!


## Noah's Ark
