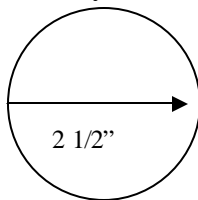

May program Carving by Mitch Galloway

Mitch Galloway lost his sight at the age of 13 due to a brain tumor. He picked up a pocket knife when he was still a teenager and proceeded to carve an elephant. The elephant's trunk broke off and the carving took the form of a pig, and then an egg he finally Mitch had a completed work of a pile of wood chips! This did not deter Mitch, he even got his brother Mike into carving!



Mitch has come a long way since that pile of wood chips! He has been carving now for 41 years and enjoys carving stylized animals.

He often will work his project first using clay and pipe cleaners. Using his clay model or a borrowed pattern, he will ask for help to cut out a blank for his carving. Mitch says he has an advantage over the rest of us because he can "see" all sides of his carving at the same time!

Mitch primarily taught himself to carve or got instruction from friends. He only had one formal class which was through the YMCA. He met one man who would let him look at all of his carvings by picking them up and feeling them with his hands. The man one time let Mitch hold a carving of a nude woman, a prized carving of the man. As Mitch was looking at this piece, the man asked Mitch if he worked.

Mitch said "yes I have a job" The man asked what Mitch did for a living being blind. Mitch told him that he is a pastor at the United Methodist Church! The man only showed Mitch carvings of animals from that time on!



Mitch brought in a spoon he carved from a pattern made from one of Cliff Rosborough's carvings. His prized possession Horse carving he nicknamed "Lucky" (the horse had every leg broken at one time or another!) He also had a pelican that had been shown on a TV news segment on a base made of teak and walnut.

Mitch carves at least 1/2 hour a day. His goal is to find a pattern and carve an Eagle in flight.
