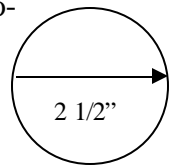

## Chip carving according to Nick “Wizard of Koz” Sciortino



Nick loved chip carving from the day he entered our club room at the EBACC to take a class given by his late mentor Larry Kampbell. Nick has also taken courses from renowned chip carver Wayne Barton, but still contends he learned more from Larry, who gave a lot to the club over the years.

Chip Carving is an old world art form that originated in Scandinavia. There are no “new” chip carving patterns that have not been used. Nick thought he had created a “new” pattern one day only to discover it had been “stolen” from him hundreds of years ago!

Only 2 knives, a protractor, a compass a t-square and a pencil are needed to chip carve. It is pertinent to use a sharp knife. The stab knife is only used to separate wood fibers after the piece has been finished and sealed. The chip carving knife is used to carve basic geometric shapes, usually triangles consisting of 65 degree angles. It only takes a few minutes to learn to chip carve but it takes a lot of practice to perfect it.

Nick copies patterns onto paper and uses Krylon 7020 to glue them to the wood.

This adhesive allows the paper to be repositioned if needed and will not stain the wood. Chip carving patterns are only limited to imagination! After the carving is complete Nick sprays it with several coats of Deft being sure to get every angle of his cuts. Nick uses gel stain if he wishes to stain his pieces. He uses only Basswood, Butternut, Walnut or Mahogany, other woods are too hard. Thank you to Cliff Rosborough for being Nick’s business manager and getting him to do this great program for us!

### Safety Report on Lyme disease

Linda Murphy came home from Germany to discover Dave had lost 15 pounds while she was gone. Linda wanted to believe it was because her husband had missed her but she soon discovered Dave has Lyme disease.

Alex Otto came home from school one afternoon and told his parents, Ed and Nikki that his knee was swollen and sore for no apparent reason. He too was diagnosed with Lyme disease.

The disease was caught early in both of these club members and therefore can be treated with antibiotics. Other club members also have had experiences with the condition. If the disease is not treated promptly it can have more devastating effects, including arthritis, heart disease and even death. Because every patient reacts differently to Lyme disease it is very hard to diagnose. It is spread by deer ticks and seems to be extremely prevalent this year. If you are outdoors in the woods or high grass always be sure to check yourself thoroughly for ticks. Don't be afraid to ask your doctor about Lyme disease if you feel you may have been exposed.
